1 CLAIRE: Happy now?

5 CLAIRE: What?

F/X: SNATCHING.

6 MARTIN: Behind your... Give me that! Your Canadian passport!

F/X: FLIPPING THROUGH PAGES.

8 MARTIN: China, China, China, China...

9 CLAIRE: Martin, I love you, and I love travelling, but you don't love

travelling.

10 MARTIN: What do you mean?

11 CLAIRE: You get this look on your face every time I so much as

mention when I lived in Peru.

12 MARTIN: I do not!

1 CLAIRE: And you sounded so content with everything, but I really

needed to travel some more before I settled down. When I

upmanship though, is it? I've done Tanzania. You've done

Peru. And China.

2 CLAIRE: Yes. (JOKING) And I guess I was born in Canada, so that's

It's so cold here. I sold my hatchback — that paid for the flights, the tent, the rest of the equipment. (CRACKING UP) Instead of looking at a beautiful carpet I'm just holding a pile of wool. As my wise friend Jaffari said, I just need to acclimatise and get in balance again, and this is how.

F/X: ZIPS, THINGS BEING MOVED INSIDE A TENT.

2 MARTIN:

I know it's childish, but I just had to go to a continent you that haven't. I needed to be able to look you in the eye and say, "Mmm! This penguin meat is gorgeous. It's very much like the penguin meat I used to eat when I walked solo to the South Pole."

F/X: TENT BEING UNZIPPED. WIND NOISE. FOOTSTEPS IN SNOW FADING AWAY.
